Overview

In this final message of the series, Paul gives an impassioned plea to be the kind of spiritual leaders that truly lead others toward Christ and build up the body of Christ. Forsaking the wisdom of this world and its deification of self and pursuing a selfless, sacrificial life allows us an incredible freedom to be who God has created us to be. When we are secure in our identity in Christ, when we know that we do not have to live for the applause of men, then we can live lives of dedication to Christ that others can follow.
