As we continue to consider together the nature and scope of the gospel, my thoughts keep coming back to those words in the Lord's Prayer, "Your Kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven." How many times have I repeated those words without any real reflection on their importance, on the implications they have for my life and for the life of our church. Do I really want God's rule in every area of my life? Do we as a church make our highest priority the worship and service of God? Do I order my thoughts and actions according to God's agenda rather than my own?

None of us can say we do this perfectly or perhaps even consistently. Thankfully God is a graceful and merciful God who knows us in all of our weaknesses and brokenness. That is the beauty of what God has done for us in Christ. We can become fully alive to all that God intended for us because of his covenant love for us.

But I fear that we have taken the gift of that grace and turned it into what Dietrich Bonhoeffer calls "cheap grace." This cheap grace presumes on God's goodness with little sense that this grace reflects a deep call to holiness, not just to excusing our sins as if they do not matter. They matter so much it took the death of the Son of God to break the power of and pay the penalty for these sins. Our transformation into Christlikeness is not an option that we choose to add on to forgiveness, but it is rather the essence of what God intends for us as his followers. It calls us to a radical presence in this world where we enjoy the experience of God personally while living in such a way as to point others to him and to the ways of his Kingdom. We get to be a part of and have a role in God's work of transforming this broken world. This is Good News.

Fortunately, God's Kingdom is a community not merely a collection of individuals. We have each other to walk with as we seek to understand better what all this means for us day by day. In the next few weeks, as we continue to consider how the gospel impacts the way we live in various ways, we will work together to wrestle with some difficult issues. What does it really mean to be in the world but not of it? What does it mean to truly love my neighbor? How do we tell the Good News? What does it mean to stand for holiness and justice?

That we are doing this during the season of our national elections affords us an even more interesting opportunity to let the gospel challenge our notions of normal. I hope you will join the conversation, opening your heart, mind, and will to however God might choose to call you deeper into experiencing life in his Kingdom.

Let the children come to me, and do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God. And he took them in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them. MARK 10:14, 16

If you are a new parent or new to Christianity, you may be wondering why you should dedicate your child and how it differs from baptism. The primary difference between a baby dedication and baptism is that a dedication is focused on the parents while the baptism is focused on the child.

A baby dedication is an opportunity for the parents to make a commitment about how their child will be raised. Parents promise before God and the church family that to the best of their ability they will raise this child in the

love and admonition of the Lord so that later, the child can choose Christ as their Savior. Later, as a public display of their choosing Christ, the child can then be baptized—usually at middle school or high school age.

In as much as these children's notion of the love of Christ will be formed by their growing up in our church, the congregation also stands and dedicates themselves to these children and this family and to being an example of Christlikeness.

Our next baby dedication will be on Sunday, November 25, during both services. First time parents need to attend a class which will be the Sunday before, November 18, during second service. Please watch the bulletin to sign up and for class information.

Year-end Status Report on VCC Finances *by Sid Niemeyer*

Our church just completed its fiscal year on September 30. The fact that I recognize that the federal government has the same fiscal year reflects the fact that my first career was at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, but it also works well for our church. It fits better with our annual rhythm in which fall represents the re-launch of many of our ministries. So as we begin a new fiscal year, the Elders and I thought it would be good to write this brief summary of our current financial status.

We continually thank God for the faithful giving of our congregation. In this past year our total contributions were \$2,125,000, which was only \$14,000 below budget. On the side of expenses, we were \$7,000 below budget. So our general fund income and expenses were well aligned with one another.

However, we do think it's important to alert you to a sudden change of pattern in contributions. In the months of August and September we experienced significantly less giving compared to our budget forecast. Prior to those last two months, we had seven straight months in which giving was above (or at) our budget. But in August we had a deficit of \$19,000, followed by September which was low by \$22,000.

We have not been able to identify any reasons for the sudden change in pattern of contributions. From time to time, we see these kinds of fluctuations, and then the prior pattern reemerges. But we also need to be alert, as it might reflect a longer-term change. We thought this was a significant enough of a change that we ought to

share it with the congregation. Please make it a matter of prayer as we enter this new fiscal year with a slightly higher budget.

Meanwhile, giving to our Setting Us Free capital campaign continues to be strong. Last November a total of \$2.3M was pledged for a 3-year period. By the end of September a total of \$1.1M had been received, with \$95,000 in September alone. To date \$1M of our debt has been paid off, and because of our commitment to tithe on these contributions, we have \$112,000 of additional funding for special missions projects. The continuing response of so many is a great source of encouragement and a testament to God at work among us.

Finally, at a recent meeting the Deacons talked about how the balance in our benevolent fund has steadily gone down over the past several years. The level of contributions to this fund has remained about the same over years, but the number of requests and the level of help that we have provided has grown during this time of extended economic difficulty. As a result, while the balance in our benevolent fund was once above \$60,000, it now stands at \$16,000. We will continue to be wise and generous in the way in which we help those who find themselves in a tough spot, and we hope that an eventual lack of funds in benevolence does not constrain us in the future.

Our staff and leaders strive to wisely use the funds that you have entrusted to us. Pray for God's continued guidance in all of our financial matters. May we give Him praise for all that He accomplishes in and through us.

Toys*: small cars, balls, harmonicas, yo-yos, jump ropes, small stuffed animals, Slinky, etc.


Hygiene items: toothbrush, toothpaste, bar soap, comb washcloth, etc.

Gifts suggestions for boys and girls




